Mechanics

Mechanics for Expansion Bible Church Teams to Ensure Success Each Expansion Bible Church will oversee a specific month's theme and ensure its successful implementation across GCBCI. Below are the key mechanics and steps to ensure this initiative's effectiveness and alignment with the church's vision.

Monthly Management Structure

Each Expansion Bible Church (EBC) Responsibilities

Ensure focus on the assigned topic through teaching, activities, and engagement.

Step-by-Step Monthly Execution Plan

General Introduction

Godliness is not a religious performance; it is a way of life. It is the active pursuit of God's righteousness in our daily interactions, decisions, and relationships—especially within our families. The home is the foundational place where faith is nurtured, character is shaped, and values are passed down.

This five-year initiative, Practicing Godliness as a Family Priority (2025-2029), is not just another program—it is a call to transformation. It is a church-wide commitment to ensuring that every home under our spiritual care reflects the holiness and wisdom of God.

Each year will focus on a different aspect of godliness in the family:

Vision Prevents Chaos

Without clear direction, guidance, or revelation from God, people fall into disorder, confusion, and ultimately destruction. The word "perish" (KJV) or "cast off restraint" (ESV) suggests a state of lawlessness, lack of discipline, chaos, and moral decay when there is no guiding vision or divine instruction.

A godly vision provides direction, discipline, and purpose.

Direction keeps individuals on track. Without it, people wander aimlessly. Discipline keeps individuals and families focused on righteousness. Without it there is no success.

Purpose gives meaning and a clear path for living. Without it one gropes around in the dark.

In the context of Practicing Godliness as a Family Priority (2025-2029), without a clear biblical vision for the family, chaos enters homes—resulting in broken relationships, moral confusion, and spiritual decline. When families commit to godliness, they gain stability, purpose, and spiritual health (Proverbs 29:18).

A family without a clear, God-centered vision is like a ship drifting without a compass. It may be moving, but it has no direction, and eventually, it will crash into the storms of life. Just as individuals need purpose, families

need a vision grounded in godliness to avoid confusion, dysfunction, and disorder.

When a household lacks a godly vision there is decline and chaos. Without a guiding purpose there is spiritual drift, families prioritize temporary things (entertainment, careers, wealth) over eternal matters (faith, character, holiness).

Without biblical standards there is moral confusion, worldly values shape family decisions, leading to compromise.

When godliness is not prioritized there are broken relationships, strife, selfishness, and division take root.

Without intentional discipleship there is a lack of legacy, faith is not passed down to the next generation.

God never intended families to operate without vision. From the beginning, He designed the home to be a place of worship, discipleship, and mission.

To counteract the chaos that comes from a lack of vision, GCBCI's five-year mandate (2025-2029) provides a structured roadmap to help families.

2025: Establish a Biblical Foundation of Godliness in the Family. Understand God's design for the family through Scripture.

2026: Develop a Christ-Centered Family Culture. Create a household where faith is naturally lived out in daily life.

2027: Pass Down the Faith to the Next Generation. Train children and young adults in righteousness.

2028: Strengthen Family Integrity Through Godly Living. Align family decisions and relationships with biblical principles.

2029: Serve God Together as a Family. Engage in ministry as a household unit.

Each year builds upon the next, ensuring long-term transformation rather than short-term inspiration.

Throughout this journey, we will engage with monthly lessons, family devotionals, practical challenges, and church-wide initiatives to make these biblical principles a living reality in our homes. Additionally, milestone evaluations will help us assess our growth and ensure that transformation is taking place.

This initiative is more than a curriculum—it is a movement. It is a call to action. It is a challenge to every family member, from the youngest child to the eldest grandparent, to take ownership of their faith and commit to a life of godliness.

As we embark on this explosive journey together, we must recognize that godliness is not about perfection—it is about progress. The world may pull us in many directions, but we must stand firm, knowing that when a family is built on the foundation of God's Word, it will not be shaken (Joshua 24:15).

2025 Biblical Foundation of Godliness in the Family

The family is the first institution created by God and is meant to reflect His holiness Genesis 2:24; Deuteronomy 6:6-7; Joshua 24:15). Learning Objectives

Understand God's design for the family as a place of spiritual growth and holiness.

Recognize the biblical roles of fathers, mothers, and children in practicing godliness.

Commit to making faith a daily priority in family life.

January

God's Design for the Family as a Holy Institution Genesis 2:24 – The establishment of marriage Deuteronomy 6:6-7 – Teaching God's Word in the home Joshua 24:15 – A family's commitment to serving the Lord

Tertullian (c. 160-225 AD) taught that Christian homes should be places of sanctification, where children learn the faith organically. Clement of Alexandria (c. 150-215 AD) encouraged parental discipline as a form of divine instruction, shaping children for godly lives.

God instituted the family as the foundation of human society, intended to reflect His holiness. The family must nurture faith and righteousness.

Parents must be intentional in discipling their children. Families should regularly engage in prayer and Scripture reading. Cross-References (Proverbs 22:6; Ephesians 6:4; Psalm 78:4).

February

The Role of the Father as Spiritual Leader Ephesians 6:4 – Fathers are to nurture children in godliness 1 Corinthians 11:3 – The headship of the father Genesis 18:19 – Abraham's role in instructing his household

Athanasius of Alexandria (c. 296-373 AD) stressed the father's role in leading by example, not mere words.

Origen (c. 184-253 AD) taught that fathers should be the primary teachers of doctrine within the home.

Fathers are called to be spiritual heads, guiding their families in holiness and teaching God's commandments.

Fathers should lead family worship and Bible study.

Fathers must model humility and godliness.

Cross-References (Deuteronomy 6:1-2; Malachi 4:6; 1 Timothy 3:4-5).

Cyril of Alexandria (c. 376-444 AD) taught the role of godly mothers in shaping future church leaders.

Augustine of Hippo (354-430 AD) referrenced his mother, Monica, as a model of Christian perseverance.

Mothers play a crucial role in forming the moral and spiritual character of children through instruction and example.

Mothers should disciple their children daily.

They must balance submission with spiritual leadership within the home. Cross-References (Judges 13:8; Luke 1:46-55; Exodus 2:9-10).

Prayer is the foundation of a godly home because it aligns the family with God's will and provides strength to overcome spiritual and physical challenges.

Paul in Philippians 4:6 teaches believers to bring every concern to God in prayer rather than being anxious.

Matthew 18:19-20 emphasizes the power of corporate prayer within a household, ensuring that when a family unites in faith, God's presence is among them.

James 5:16 affirms that righteous prayer has great power and is effective in bringing transformation.

Families should develop a daily prayer habit, covering every area of life. Parents must lead by example in demonstrating faith-filled prayers. Teach children to pray for wisdom, protection, and guidance. Engage in family intercession, praying for others in need.

January

The Foundation of a Christ-Centered Home

Problem

What is the foundation of a Christ-Centered home?

Premise

The home is the cornerstone of society, and for a Christian family, it is meant to reflect Christ's presence, love, and authority.

Philosophy

Colossians 3:16; Ephesians 5:25; 1 Thessalonians 5:17; Matthew 7:24-27; Joshua 24:15; Deuteronomy 6:6-7; Psalm 127:1.

Principle

A home that places Christ at its center becomes a sanctuary where faith is nurtured, love abounds, and biblical principles guide daily life. Just as the early Church Fathers, including Tertullian (c. 155-220 AD), affirmed that a Christian household should function like a church, today's families must intentionally cultivate an environment where Christ reigns supreme.

Paul's letters emphasize three fundamental pillars of a Christ-centered home: love, prayer, and the Word of God.

Love as the Foundation – In Ephesians 5:25, Paul commands husbands to love their wives as Christ loved the Church. This sacrificial love reflects God's nature and promotes an atmosphere of unity and peace. Likewise, Colossians 3:16 instructs believers to let the Word of Christ dwell richly in them, teaching and admonishing one another with wisdom and gratitude. When love governs a home, conflicts are resolved in grace, and relationships flourish under the guidance of Scripture.

Prayer as a Lifeline – In 1 Thessalonians 5:17, Paul exhorts believers to "pray without ceasing." A home rooted in prayer invites divine intervention, sustains faith, and strengthens family bonds. Structured prayer times—whether in the morning, before meals, or before bedtime—anchor the household in God's presence. Families that pray together experience

greater resilience during trials, knowing God hears and answers their petitions.

God's Word as the Authority – Deuteronomy 6:6-7 commands parents to teach God's Word diligently to their children, discussing it daily. The household is the primary setting for spiritual instruction, shaping young hearts to follow Christ. A home where Scripture is read, memorized, and applied will develop individuals who stand firm in faith despite societal pressures.

Jesus vividly illustrates the importance of a strong foundation in Matthew 7:24-27, likening those who hear and obey His words to a wise man who builds his house on the rock. Storms will come—financial struggles, health crises, and relational conflicts—but a household firmly rooted in Christ will withstand every trial. Without Christ as the cornerstone, a family is vulnerable to collapse, much like a house built on shifting sand.

Joshua 24:15 echoes this call to commitment: "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." This declaration is more than a statement of faith; it is a daily decision to honor God in every aspect of home life. Parents must set the example, prioritizing worship, study, and righteous living to lead their children toward a lasting relationship with God.

Psalm 127:1 reinforces this principle: "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain." A home built on human effort alone will falter, but one established on Christ's teachings will thrive in every season.

Establish Daily Prayer and Devotion – Set aside specific family prayer and Bible reading times to create spiritual discipline.

Demonstrate Christ's Love in Relationships – Model forgiveness, patience, and kindness in interactions within the home.

Encourage Scripture Memorization and Application – Help children and adults integrate God's Word into daily decisions.

Commit to Church and Fellowship - Engage in regular worship and the

Christian community to reinforce faith beyond the home.

A Christ-centered home does not happen by chance—it is built through intentional love, unwavering prayer, and a firm commitment to God's Word. Like Tertullian's vision of a household that mirrors the Church, families today must cultivate an environment where Christ's presence is unmistakable. By embracing biblical principles and prioritizing spiritual growth, a home becomes a beacon of faith, a refuge of love, and a testament to God's unwavering guidance. The storms of life may rage, but a house built on the Rock will never fall.

Paul emphasizes the role of love, prayer, and God's Word in the household (Colossians 3:16; Ephesians 5:25; 1 Thessalonians 5:17).

Tertullian (c. 155-220 AD) stressed that a Christian home should be like a church, where Christ is the center.

A home built on Christ reflects His love, leadership, and wisdom. Establish structured prayer and Bible study times. A strong foundation prevents a house from collapsing (Matthew 7:24-27; Joshua 24:15; Deuteronomy 6:6-7; Psalm 127:1).

February

The Role of Fathers in Spiritual Leadership

Athanasius of Alexandria (c. 296-373 AD) taught that fathers must be the first pastors of their households. This idea aligns with the biblical vision of fatherhood as a role of spiritual leadership, nurturing, instruction, and correction in the faith. Fathers are divinely mandated to shape their children's spiritual and moral foundations, embodying the love, discipline, and wisdom of God.

Fathers are to nurture, instruct, and correct their children in Christ (Ephesians 6:4; Proverbs 22:6; Malachi 4:6). Fathers have a divine responsibility to lead with wisdom and discipline. Set an example through prayer, teaching, and moral leadership. Like a shepherd guiding sheep, fathers must lead with care (John 10:11-14; Psalm 103:13; 1 Corinthians 11:3; Genesis 18:19).

Fathers are spiritual pastors of their homes (Ephesians 6:4). Paul instructs fathers to guide their children toward godliness without exasperating them. This requires a delicate balance of discipline and love, ensuring that correction is rooted in righteousness rather than harshness (Proverbs 22:6).

Fathers must actively teach biblical principles and establish a foundation of faith that will remain steadfast throughout their children's lives.

Athanasius argued that Christian fathers should embody the role of Christ as the shepherd of their families. In this pastoral role, a father does not merely provide for his children physically but also spiritually, leading them in truth and prayer.

The greatest teaching a father can offer is the example of a godly life. Children often emulate what they see rather than what they are told (Genesis 18:19).

Abraham's legacy was built upon his faithfulness in instructing his household. Fathers must embody Christlike character, demonstrating faith,

integrity, and devotion to God.

Jesus, the Good Shepherd, provides a model for fathers (John 10:11-14).

A father's leadership is not about exerting power, but about sacrificial love. His role is to lead his family with wisdom and humility, prioritizing their spiritual well-being above all.

Paul teaches us that a father's leadership must be modeled after Christ's leadership of the Church. This is not about domination but about serving as a protector, guide, and intercessor for the family (1 Corinthians 11:3).

Just as a shepherd watches over his flock, a father must guide his family in spiritual truth. Psalm 103:13 illustrates this tenderness:

"As a father shows compassion to his children, so the Lord shows compassion to those who fear Him."

A father's authority is not a tool for oppression but a means of nurturing. This is why Malachi 4:6 prophesies about the restoration of fatherhood: "He will turn the hearts of the fathers to their children, and the hearts of the children to their fathers."

This verse highlights the significance of a father's role in reconciliation, restoration, and spiritual continuity. A home where a father leads in prayer, teaching, and moral discipline is a home where the next generation is prepared to carry the faith forward.

The consequences of neglecting spiritual leadership are grave. Scripture warns of the dangers when fathers fail in their divine duty. The priest Eli failed to discipline his sons, and as a result, they brought ruin upon Israel (1 Samuel 2:12-17, 3:13). His negligence led to God's judgment, demonstrating that failure in spiritual leadership has dire consequences.

Likewise, in Judges 2:10-12, after Joshua's generation, a new generation arose that did not know the Lord. Why? The fathers of Israel neglected their responsibility to pass down the faith. This underscores the urgency for fathers today to prioritize spiritual instruction.

Fathers have a holy responsibility to lead with wisdom, discipline, and love. They are shepherds in the home, called to model righteousness, guide their children in faith, and create a legacy of godliness. Like Athanasius of Alexandria taught, they must be the first pastors of their households.

Let every father rise to this calling, leading their families in prayer, teaching, and moral leadership, so that their children may walk in the ways of the Lord and not depart from them.

Families should practice serving one another in love, prioritizing the needs of others.

Just as a lamp gives light to a room, a servant-hearted believer illuminates the lives of those around them (Mark 10:45; Galatians 5:13; 1 Peter 5:5-6).

Just as a bridge carries the weight of travelers, believers should help carry the weight of others' difficulties (1 Thessalonians 5:11; Philippians 2:4; 1 Corinthians 12:26).

Trusting in God means surrendering to His will and resting in His promises. Trust in God leads to a confident and obedient life.

Families should cultivate a culture of unwavering faith in God's Word, even in adversity. Families should cultivate deep trust in God's promises. Just as a lighthouse guides ships through storms, faith in God's promises provides direction and security in life's trials. Just as a bridge supports travelers, faith supports believers (Psalm 37:5; Romans 8:28; Mark 11:24; James 1:6).

Worship is more than singing—it is a lifestyle of honoring and glorifying God in all things (Psalm 150:6; Colossians 3:16; John 4:23-24).

A home centered on worship acknowledges God's presence daily. Families should incorporate worship through prayer, song, and Scripture. Just as oxygen is essential for breathing, worship is vital for a spiritually healthy home (Ephesians 5:19-20; 1 Chronicles 16:29; Romans 12:1).

A Christ-centered family intentionally makes decisions that honor Him. Families should cultivate a lifestyle that glorifies God through words, actions, and relationships.

Just as a lighthouse guides ships, a God-glorifying family influences others toward Christ (Matthew 5:16; Psalm 115:1; Romans 11:36).
